Greetings fellow Legionnaires,

The Fall Conference has come and gone, and I have to say it was a good one. Lots of information was discussed. We also had a visit from National Vice Commander Bill Roy. Next up is the Mid-Winter conference to be held at the Hampton Inn located just off I-89 exit 16. We are currently starting to plan for it and hope to make it very informative.

Recently there have been emails in my name landing in everyone's inboxes asking for donations of gift cards. The emails are not from me and should be deleted. These are phishing attempts that aim to scam people out of money. If you look closely at the email address that they are being sent from, you can see that it is not coming from me. My email is listed at the end of this article. Unfortunately, there is no way for us to stop them other than reporting them to the Federal Trade Commission (ReportFraud.ftc.gov) and it is not guaranteed that they will be able to stop them either. We all just need to be mindful of these emails and not even reply to them. If it allows you to report it as spam or a phishing attempt, please do so.

One thing that we talked about at the Fall Conference is a project that I am starting. This is called veterans and video gaming. I am working on forming a committee for this and hope to have it ratified at the Mid-Winter Conference. There are some Departments that have already started this and held gaming tournaments with great success. The Department of California is heading this up and if we can get 30 departments on board with this and pass resolutions, National HQ will create an E-Gaming Commission. They have partnered with Regiment Gaming, Stack Up, and Operation Comfort Warrior.

Online gaming gives veterans with TBIs and PTSD the spirit of fellowship, and support online and growing the space where our veterans and their families can bond over their shared passion for online gaming.

FACTS

 \cdot 64% of households have at least one gaming device.

 \cdot 55% of avid gamers say that they play video games to connect with their friends or family.

 \cdot 50% of veterans used video games to cope with challenges associated with their military service.

• According to the Department of Veterans Affairs 2021 National Veteran Suicide Prevention report, an average of 17.2 Veterans committed suicide per day in 2019.

• According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, 11-20% of Veterans who served in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom, 12% of Gulf War Veterans, and 15% of Vietnam Veterans have PTSD in any given year.

• Mental health conditions are treatable with the VA offering a wide range of effective treatments and services for Veterans with mental health conditions, including a bundled public health approach involving multiple sectors, including the media and entertainment industries.

• Studies conducted by WebMD and reviewed by Dan Brennan, MD, playing video games has numerous benefits for mental health, including mental stimulation, feeling accomplished, mental health recovery, social interaction, and emotional resilience.

 \cdot On May 22, 2019, Mike Richman from VA Research Communications reported that studies with a small sample of veterans trying to recover from mental health issues found that video games can help in overcoming such problems as PTSD and substance abuse disorders.

I have a resolution that can be used for this, and I plan to send it out to all Posts to jump on board if they choose to. PCs that Posts purchase to be used for gaming can also be used as a resource center for our veterans. You don't even need to purchase a PC for this. You can use PlayStation, and Xbox consoles set up with online access and communication headsets.

Does a local American Legion Post need a bar, lounge, bingo hall or any other type of business to be successful? Answer: No, but it sure helps.

During this past year here in Vermont, mismanagement of a Post and its business deteriorated to the point of having problems with VT Taxes, the IRS, overdue bills, etc., thus causing it to be headed for bankruptcy. However, thanks to the hard work and persistence from the Legion's State, County, and local members plus that of the Auxiliary, Son's, and many community members it was brought under control and is now proceeding to be a model Post.

How can similar problems be avoided by other Posts? Answer: Presently, it is difficult to prevent such failures because it doesn't become noticeable until it's almost too late and the end is near. Often the failure can be accounted to mismanagement as a result of not following a good business and poor or no bookkeeping/accounting. An easy solution would be to require

all Posts to follow an approved business and accounting program. The problem is the Posts choose the way and how they account for their business and are not required to follow instructions from the district. The district often gets involved when the Post is near complete failure. And when this happens it takes a lot of time a money to correct the mess.

My thoughts for a solution to hopefully prevent such a catastrophe from happening: Have the DEC develop a business and accounting plan that could be used by all VT American Legion Posts. Offer the plan to all Posts. If the Post accepts the plan and agrees to abide by it, they would be guaranteed help/assistance from the Department in case they experienced difficulties and need help. Otherwise, they would be on their own.

Again, Thanks to all who helped save the above-mentioned Post.

Another Look Back

In 1950 the 32nd Annual Department Convention was held at St. Johnsbury; quaintly identified as the scales and sweets capital of Vermont. Post #58 hosted the event at the State Armory. The Department Commander, A. Luke Crispe, a member of Brattleboro Post #5, chaired this four-day conference.

During the Convention the members took note of some significant accomplishments. Perhaps most noteworthy was the establishment of a new headquarters location for the American Legion Department of Vermont and the Legion Auxiliary at 126 Main Street in Montpelier by an act of the Vermont General Assembly. The Department and Auxiliary were justifiably proud of their new headquarters and invited all members to drop by to see the facility.

Other highlights were that: 1) the Boys State program was held at Norwich University with 225 boys in attendance, 2) the national membership quota was reached with Vermont ranking number 8 in the Nation, 3) the attendees celebrated the attainment of 13,080 Legionnaires in 78 Posts in the State, and 4) the cost for dinner tickets in 1950 was \$1.50 per person (this might

not have been a highlight 73 years ago but in light of today's cost of \$35 per person it has the feeling of a highlight).

Vermont's Governor at that time, Harold J. Arthur, commented, "We come together again as Veterans of our two great wars at a time of world turmoil and unrest, not only to celebrate in spirit of comradeship and reflect upon the ideals for which these conflicts were fought and won, but also to chart another leg of the course for this great organization to pursue for the good of mankind." These comments seem to have a timeless quality and with few edits could be said again at our 2024 Annual Convention.

"Be the One". Why is this a priority right now?

Today, the No. 1 issue facing those who served is veteran suicide, according to the National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report. Each day, at least 17 veterans die by suicide. That is more than 6,000 each year. The rate of suicide for veterans is more than 50% higher than that of non-veteran adults. As the Global War on Terrorism and unrest in the world continues, there will be more veterans facing mental-health issues such as post-traumatic stress disorder.

Destigmatize asking for mental health support, creating opportunity for those with mental health issues to speak freely and get the support they need.

If you are a veteran in crisis, resources are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week: • Call 988 and press 1, • Text 838255.

Buddy Checks. Posts are strongly encouraged, by resolution, to make Buddy Check calls during Veterans Week (mid-November) and American Legion Birthday Week (mid-March). Please take part and make the call and personal contact.

National dues are increasing by \$5 starting in 2025.

Each Paid Up For Life member receives a permanent plastic card, as well as an annual paper card to verify continuing membership in The American Legion. The annual card is mailed in July of each year.

For Post and Department Officers (Effective June 1, 2016)

Effective June 1, 2016 all previous Paid Up For Life rate charts are superseded and the online version is the only valid rate chart; it is based on post dues of \$48.00 or less. If the post's dues are \$48.01 or higher, please call National's Customer Service number to receive a price quote. If you have any questions, you should contact your department headquarters or call Customer Service at 1-800-433-3318 for assistance.

Lifetime membership can be paid either in one single lump sum or over 12 equal, monthly payments. If a member chooses the Time Pay Plan, payment must be made by credit card only. (Check for online promotions if paying in full.) Once a member fulfills the PUFL membership dues, he/she will be protected from any future dues increases at the post, department or national levels.

All PUFL applications must be submitted to National Headquarters by one of two methods:

1. Online applications: Visit MyLegion.org to complete an online application.

2. Call Customer Service: Members can speak to a customer service specialist by calling **1-800-433-3318**. They can answer questions regarding the PUFL program as well as print and mail PUFL applications or take them over the phone.
