Just before the holiday, on Veterans Day, I had the wonderful opportunity to join our Sons of the American Legion at their annual Dodge House visit and lunch in Rutland. This group of hardworking young people, and some not so young, members presented Chris Morgan, Executive Director, with a check for \$16,400. I must also add that they brought the lunch and dessert for all with them as well. Kudos to these wonderful individuals, and the work they do for not only the Dodge House,

but for veterans throughout the state all year long. Well done gentlemen and thank you from a proud dual member.

2022 is quickly ending with the Christmas Holidays and the New Year's celebration upon us. In January we will all really have to work hard on membership and continue that push throughout the months to follow. There are plenty of veterans out there who are eligible for membership, and we have to just let them know we are here and showcase what we do. We must sell the American Legion and tell our story. Each of our posts has to use social media, in addition to our local media outlets, to create interest in what we do and to entice new members. Once we get these new members through the door, we must mentor them to ensure we keep them. Without mentorship there is a high probability that these new members will become "non-renewals" down the road. We can stop this trend by having an effective mentorship program at the post level. These mentors are advisors to the new and less experienced members. A mentor should NOT be someone who walks ahead to show how they did it, but rather, someone who walks alongside to show what the new member can do while providing advice, and an ear to listen. As I have recently read: The mediocre mentor tells. The good mentor explains. The superior mentor demonstrates. The greatest mentors inspire. If we do not adapt and change our ways as relates to telling our story, recruiting, and mentoring our outlook may be bleak. As W. Edwards Deming once stated "It is not necessary to change. Survival is not mandatory."

Also coming up quickly is Americanism Month, February. Americanism, one of the Four Pillars of the American Legion, is the unfailing love of country and all that falls under that umbrella. The American Legion has numerous programs as relates to Americanism. Some of the notable programs are Boys State and Boys Nation, Flag Education, Scouting, Law Cadet, Operation Comfort Warrior, Legion Baseball, and Oratorical. We should all be actively involved in promoting these programs. For example, all posts should be actively promoting and urging their local high schools now to encourage participation in our Oratorical Program and assist with local, district, and state competitions. It is so inspiring to see these young adults develop a keen knowledge and understanding of the U.S, Constitution and write, practice, and then rewrite their oral presentation with hopes of being selected for the next level of competition. Each contest has two phases: an eight-to-ten-minute prepared oration and a three to five minute assigned topic presentation. All of the participants have their eye on the prize, scholarship awards at both Department and National Levels. These young orators are utterly amazing.

Please have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. May the new year bring us all peace, good health and happiness. Be the reason someone smiles today. An extra smile, cheerful greeting, a kind word of appreciation or encouragement – It will cost you nothing and yet it can be a great gift.

I know month after month I talk about membership. As we all know isn't only the post commanders, adjutants, or membership chair's responsibility. The responsibility of membership relies on all of us. Without members, we would not have the American Legion.

If you are trying to recruit new members or even getting older members to renew let them know why the American Legion is worth joining. American Legion posts should be used as community centers. Currently, the average age of an American Legion member is 67. What is going to happen without membership once this age group has faded away? We need to concentrate on recruiting younger aged veterans. I fear that without them there will be no more American Legion. Make sure to let expired and new members know that the American Legion isn't just a bar with cheap drink prices. If you are trying to recruit younger veterans, purchase them their first year's membership so they can see what the American Legion is all about. After all the holidays are among us. Here are a couple of reminders:

- The American Legion provides life-changing assistance and guidance for veterans, active-duty personnel, their families, and communities around the world.
- The American Legion offers Expert Advice, support, and representation for veterans and their families seeking benefits.
- Operation Comfort Warrior helps active-duty Military personnel and recently discharged veterans recover and adjust to lifestyle changes.
- The American Legion is the most influential, non-partisan, effective, and dependable advocate of veterans' affairs fighting for better active duty pay and VA issues. One great example is the PACT Act. The American Legion was very instrumental in getting the bill passed. The American Legion uses strength in numbers to help get important legislation concerning Veterans passed.

Our next goal of 75% is December 14<sup>th</sup>. I am confident that we can reach this goal. Our last goal of 65% made it with room to spare and I am hoping that we can keep the momentum going. As of November 21<sup>st</sup>, we are at 67.95% with 651 needed to meet the goal.

I am setting a membership challenge for Post Commanders, Adjutants, and Membership Chairs. I can't give the particulars in this message because it would make it too long. Keep an eye out in your mailboxes for a letter from Department HQ regarding this. I am still waiting to hear from a few districts on dates for membership training.

Be safe and stay healthy and remember you can **BE THE ONE** to help a veteran in need.

We also plan to hand out an Adjutants guidebook with many different references that may be useful to the Post members or their level of responsibility in the performance of their jobs.

Then following the training workshops, we get to gather for the Mid-Winter conference on January 21 at the DoubleTree Hotel in So Burlington. More information about that event will be covered in another article in this newsletter or to follow shortly.

#### JOSH PALLOTTA FUND / JOSH'S

Some of you may remember Valerie Pallotta as one of the founders of the Vermont Chapter of Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc. Her involvement was a result of her son Joshua joining the Vermont National Guard and deploying to Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom. When Josh returned, he was a broken person with both physical injuries and PTSD.

In 2014 Josh lost the battle with the demons inside of him and took his own life. His mother became a crusader for all other veterans suffering and for suicide prevention and awareness. As a result, Val founded the Josh Pallotta Fund and ultimately Josh's House, which is a wellness and recreational center providing a myriad of services and activities for veterans. It is located at the old Fort Ethan Allen at 162 Hegeman Avenue in Colchester. It is a wonderful location. You should stop by and check out this vibrant and accessible facility. Their goal is to have two other like facilities in the state, one in the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont, where our veterans are so underserved, as well as one in the southern area. I want to help them, and Val, achieve this goal.

This is so important for all our veterans. The Sons and the Auxiliary realize this as well. For the first time all of us have the same project to help give them a great push in achieving their wonderful goals. There is also a race to see which of us can raise the most for this important endeavor.....Please Help.....

The non-member veteran would be even more likely to feel isolated and alone, especially at this time of year. The younger veteran may not be as financially secure as some of the older, more established veterans. They may be trying to juggle a military career, a family, and bills on a less than ideal income. Let them know that they are not alone in their struggles. You might consider gifting a membership to a non-member veteran so they can see for themselves that there are others who have been there, done that, and can help them cope. Be The One. The one who pulls a veteran back from the brink, who provides a holiday meal or gifts to a veteran in need. The one who simply listens to a veteran who needs to vent in order to maintain their own mental health. Sometimes the only thing it will cost is a little bit of time while you listen. Be The One.

Buddy checks are a really effective way to stay in touch and make a difference.

It is great to announce the 5<sup>th</sup> District Commander position is now filled! Andrew Sheldon from Post 36 has stepped up to this leadership position. Thank you, Andy.

Fowlers R&R Ranch in Whiting has been contributing 30 1-to-5-pound packages of Jersey beef, thirty small jars of honey and several dozen eggs to the Veterans Center Food Shelf every disbursement day since February. Ballard-Hobart Legion Post 36 assisted by Rutland Post 31 and Barre Unit 10 sponsored a fundraising raffle for the farm and a Ludlow Legionnaire was the lucky winner of fifty-five pounds of beef! Friends of the Ranch from Rutland Post 31 also helped put the plastic over the hoops to enclose the greenhouse at the farm. Many thanks to all who

supported us. Fowlers are already planning new ways to help with food security for veterans and the local community. They may even be able to raise some greens this winter!

I have mentioned before my interest in the Meals on Wheels program in Vermont which is usually administered by the local senior centers. When I was delivering for my local center, I found that a good percentage of all the route clients were older veterans. Given the increased food costs these days, I would encourage our Posts to connect with the local centers and donate food or funding to help them over the holiday season. I was able to participate in the Ballard Hobart Post 36 Veterans' Day service and also their Early Bird dinner. It is a pleasure to get out and meet our veterans and honor their service. #### **National Commander's Incentive Program**

American Legion National Commander Vincent J. "Jim" Troiola will award his national commander "Be Then One" membership excellence pin to any Legionnaire who obtains three new members into The American Legion.

A new member is any eligible person joining for the 2023 membership year who was not a member of The American Legion during the 2022 membership year. Transfers do not count as new members. Each member listed must be eligible for membership in The American Legion. Forward names of Sons of The American Legion members or Auxiliary members to your squadron or unit for use in their respective incentive programs. Only one pin will be awarded per individual. Upon receipt, national membership staff will confirm the names in the national database and mail the pin directly to the person who earned it.

As we all know, this time of year our membership starts to slide. You can all help prevent or at least slow the slide.

Our next goal is quickly approaching. We need to be at 75% by December 14<sup>th</sup>. As of 21 November, the department of Vermont is at 67.95% with 651 renewals or new memberships needed to reach 75%. This is something that I am confident that we can meet. #### **National Security Update - National Guard and Reserves**

#### Law Enforcement Officer and Fighter Fire of the Year Awards Submissions

Each year, The American Legion gives its National Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award to a well-rounded law enforcement officer who has exceeded the duty requirements expected of their position and has demonstrated a distinct pattern of community service coupled with professional achievement. The award, especially considering heroic acts, is presented annually at the Legion's national convention.

Department Law and Order Committees are encouraged to select and honor a Law Enforcement Officer of the Year at their conventions. Departments nominate their winners for the national award by <u>submitting an application</u> to The American Legion. <u>Applications must be received no later than Feb. 1.</u> Departments may only submit one nomination per year. Only department winners are eligible for the national award, which will be awarded <u>in person</u> to the winner at national convention.

As of 2010, The American Legion has given a National **Firefighter** of the Year Award to a firefighter who has exceeded the requirements expected of their position and has shown a distinct pattern of community service and professional achievement. The award, which takes into account heroic acts, will be given annually at the Legion's national convention. Departments nominate their winners for the national award by submitting an application to the National Security Division via email to <a href="Miriffel@legion.org">Nriffel@legion.org</a>.
