He then proceeded to put a challenge out to the floor to pass the hat and raise money for Mark Tangney's \$100,000 in medical bills that are not being covered. In the end, this challenge raised \$6001.00 in donations. I just want to say, GREAT JOB LEW!

BE THE ONE is a great effort and it does work. Please folks if you see someone that is struggling, please reach out to them and just talk to them. Ask them how they are doing, ask them if there is anything that you can do for them, and ask if there is anything that they need. I know that I have been practicing this with someone who means a lot to me and has become a great friend. So please BE THE ONE to reach out, BE THE ONE to listen, BE THE ONE to someone who is struggling with how they are doing. Just saving one life helps!

Oratorical Program – Karlene DeVine

Oratorical Comes Early this year (2023-2024). Student Applications must be postmarked no later than Oct. 14, 2023. Available https://vtlegion.org/documents/oratorical_application_2024.pdf

It is a progressive contest—sponsored by your American Legion Post, a contest will be held within your school area between October to December 2023. The next level, District contests will be from November to January.

The final Vermont contest will be held in February 2024. (This is a sequence change from previous years.) I have sent 958 emails (81 VT schools) to Vermont educators, principals, superintendents, guidance counselors and theater/drama teachers. My email asks them to get the information out to students before the close of this school year. Summer is a perfect time to work with the Assigned Topics.

As a broke prospective college student, do you know what the best vehicle to have is? A Scholarship! Do you know of a high school student that likes history, is interested in the U.S. Constitution or wins every argument with rationale explanations? Is that student planning on college? Does that student need help with paying for college? Perhaps you know an adult that likes history, is interested in the U.S. Constitution, or wins every argument with rational explanations? Wouldn't he or she make a good coach for a student representing your post?

You are the boots on the ground for this premier American Legion program. The most effective, least expensive publicity is your advocacy for the Oratorical Program. The first thing to do after elections of new Post, District and Department Officers is to make a calendar of events, including dates for your local Post or District Oratorical contest.

American Legion Brand

When it comes to designing products for American Legion events and programs, National Headquarters has developed a style guide to help you create designs that match our existing brand and brandmark. This guide walks you through color, font and layout specifications among others. It also will walk you through when to use the emblem versus the brand mark. To access the style guide visit legion.org/brand.

The brand mark is to be used in all marketing communications applications (e.g., lifestyle apparel, fundraising, sponsorships, digital media, social media and event announcements). While the emblem should be reserved for official documents and communications (e.g., press releases, business cards, post signage and official letterhead).

The American Legion emblem and other legally protected logos of the American Legion Family is restricted and typically may not be used without permission from National Headquarters.

The use of the emblem by an individual Legionnaire is limited to the wearing of the official insignia and to the possession of authorized jewelry or merchandise bearing the insignia. Posts are confined to using the emblem or reproduction of the emblem on stationery, post publications, notices, posters or place cards, or matters of similar character used in the ordinary routine and conduct of legitimate post business. Departments are similarly limited.

Any other use of the name "The American Legion" or the emblem shall be subject to the approval of the national adjutant at legion.org/emblem/request.



Daniel J. Seehafer National Commander The American Legion 2023-2024

Daniel J. Seehafer was elected national commander of the nation's largest veteran's organization on August 31, 2023, in Charlotte, N.C., during The American Legion's 104th national convention. Seehafer likes to say, "It's personal," when it comes to The American Legion's mission of



serving veterans and their families. He is continuing the theme of "Be the One," to prevent veteran suicide.

An ordained minister from Wisconsin, he earned his American Legion eligibility through service in the U.S. Navy and Navy Reserve, where he served as a military chaplain. A member of American Legion Post 157 in Horicon, Wis., Seehafer served in a number of American Legion offices at every level, including national chaplain and commander of the Department of Wisconsin.

Born and raised in Merrill, Wis., he lettered in cross-country track while in high school and later received a bachelor's degree in pastoral ministry from Concordia University and a Master of Divinity at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Ind.

Seehafer was installed as assistant pastor of St. Stephen Lutheran Church in Horicon in 1997 and continues to serve as administrative pastor of the church and its school. His American Legion post was recognized for "100 percent" and "All-Time High" in membership during his terms as commander and adjutant. Other honors include district commander's new post achievement award, silver brigade, and Post 157 Legionnaire of the Year.

In 2023, Seehafer earned an Outstanding Heroism Award for administering the Heimlich Maneuver to a choking victim at an American Legion dinner.

National Commander Seehafer and his wife, Stacey, who is a member of American Legion Auxiliary Unit 157, live in Beaver Dam, Wis. Dan's son, Jacob, and daughter, Emma, are also members of the Post 157 family. Dan is the son of the late Lester Seehafer and Jean Sabatke.
